THIRTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Deuteronomy 6:2-6

Moses commands the people to love and fear God, and always keep the commandments that they were given. He tells them to observe all statutes so that they will continue to grow and prosper, and tells them that they must love God with all their soul and strength.

Second Reading: Hebrews 7:23-28

Under the old covenant there were many priests, but Jesus will now remain high priest forever because he will live forever, and always be available to those who want to be saved. He does not need to offer sacrifice every day for the sins of his people, because he offered himself up in payment for their sins.

Gospel: Mark 12:28-34

One of the scribes asked Jesus which commandment is the first, and he replied that the first is to love and honor the Lord and no one else. Jesus explained that they must love God with all their heart, and love their neighbor. The scribe agreed that loving God completely and loving one's neighbor is better than any sacrifice they could make.

The Saint of the Week

St. Charles Borromeo

(November 4)

St. Charles Borromeo was born on October 2, 1538 at the castle of Arona on Lake Maggiore near Milan. His father was the Count of Arona and his mother a member of the House of Medici. He was the third of six children born to the couple.

At the age of 12, the young Charles dedicated himself to a life of service to the Church. He suffered from a speech impediment that made him appear slow to those who did not know him. Despite this challenge, he performed well and impressed his teachers. He attended the University of Pavia and learned Latin.

In 1554 his father passed away and although Charles was a teenager, responsibility for his household fell to him. Charles continued in his studies and earned a doctorate in canon and civil law.

Life sped up for the young Charles after his uncle, Cardinal Giovanni Angelo Medici became Pope Pius IV on December 25, 1559. The new pope asked his nephew to come to Rome and appointed him as a cardinal-deacon. With the rank came the job of assisting and advising his uncle full-time.

With the new rank came even more duties including the government of the Papal States, the supervision of the Knights of Malta, the Franciscans, and the Carmelites. He was only 23 years old.

Borromeo was appointed administrator of the Archdiocese of Milan in 1560. Since he would become the ecclesiastical administrator of Milan, he decided that the Lord was calling him to the priesthood. Borromeo was ordained first to the order of deacon. Then, he was ordained to the holy priesthood on September 4, 1563. Then, he was ordained as a bishop on December 7, 1563. He became Archbishop of Milan in May 12, 1564.

Milan was the largest diocese in the Catholic Church at the time and corruption was rampant. The Protestant Reformation was spreading throughout northern Europe. The greatest defense against Protestant doctrinal errors and claims against the hierarchy of the Catholic Church was reform and the restoration of integrity to the Catholic Church. His strategy was to provide education to many clergy he saw as ignorant. He founded schools and seminaries and colleges for clergy.

In 1576 a famine struck Milan followed by the plague, and many of the wealthy and powerful fled the city. Archbishop Borromeo remained. He used his own fortune to feed the starving people. When that money was spent, he took loans and went deep into debt. He may have fed 70,000 people per day. Eventually, the Archbishop convinced the local governor to return to his post and care for the people.

In 1583, Archbishop Borromeo traveled to Switzerland and began work suppressing heresy there. Protestant heresies, along with witchcraft and sorcery had been widely reported. He founded the Collegium Helveticum to serve and educate Swiss Catholics.

Eventually, the Archbishop's life of work and toil began to take its toll. In 1584, he became ill with a fever. He returned to Milan where his conditioned worsened. When it became obvious he would die, he was given his last Sacraments. He died on November 3, at the age of 46.

Polskie Duszpasterstwo w Parafii św. Bernarda i św. Stanisława Kostki



31 NIEDZIELA ZWYKLA B

Miłość Boga i bliźniego nie jest narzuconym nam ideałem etycznym, ale darem Jezusa dla nas. On sam żył, miłując Ojca całym swoim umysłem.

Okazał to szczególnie w godzinie męki, gdy modlił się: "Abba, nie to, co Ja chcę, ale to, co Ty niech się stanie!", i gdy pozwolił nałożyć sobie na głowę cierniową koronę. Miłość do Boga ze wszystkich sił objawił, gdy pozwolił przybić do krzyża swoje ręce i nogi, i gdy pozornie pokonany, dokonał największej przemiany w dziejach ludzkości. Miłość Boga całym swoim sercem okazał najbardziej wtedy, gdy Jego bok został przebity włócznią. Miłość bliźniego jak siebie samego Jezus okazał zwłaszcza wtedy gdy złożył swoje życie w ofierze za wielu i gdy modlił się: "Przebacz im, bo nie wiedzą, co czynią". Jezus więc ofiaruje nam to najwyższe przykazanie jako już wypełnione w Nim samym.

Miłość to sposób istnienia Boga, a także droga do realizacji najgłębszego pragnienia człowieka: by być jak Bóg. Nie jest ona możliwa bez Jezusa, bez trwania w głębokiej jedności z Nim.

Jezus nie każe nam miłować bliźniego ponad wszystko, miłością absolutną. Tak miłość byłaby nawet pewnego rodzaju bałwochwalstwem i nakładałaby na ukochanego człowieka ciężar naszych potrzeb i oczekiwań niemożliwy dlań do udźwignięcia. Można tu przypomnieć słowa Izajasza: "Oto ty się opierasz na Egipcie, na tej nadłamanej lasce trzcinowej, która, gdy się kto oprze na niej, wchodzi w dłoń i przebija ją. Taki jest faraon, król egipski, dla wszystkich, którzy w nim pokładają nadzieję".

Niezdrowy i niedojrzały afekt zniewala zarówno kochającego jak i kochanego. Jeżeli tego rodzaju uczucie nie jest miarkowane Bożymi przykazaniami, bywa przyczyną wielu dramatów, gdy na przykład mąż lub żona ulegają złudzeniu, że miłość małżonka wystarczy, by wypełnić całe ich życie, i nie chcą szukać prawdziwego oparcia w Bogu. Podobnie, gdy któreś z rodziców ulokuje wszystkie swoje uczucia w dziecku, wówczas bardzo trudne do zaakceptowania staje się doświadczenie opuszczenia przez dorosłego syna czy córkę, którzy zawierają małżeństwo.

Miłość do drugiego człowieka ponad wszystko, tak jakby był on bogiem, sprawić może, iż odejście czy śmierć kogoś takiego staje się doświadczeniem przekreślającym sens życia.


Liturgy of the Word is at the 9AM Mass on the 2nd and 4th Sunday of the Month for grades K-2, in the Church Chapel.



From Fr. Marcin's Desk

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

At the heart of this Sunday's Gospel passage, there is the commandment of love: love of God and love of neighbor. A scribe asks Jesus: "Which commandment is the first of all?" He responds by quoting the profession of faith with which every Israelite opens and closes his day, and begins with the words "Hear O Israel: The Lord our God is one Lord." In this manner Israel safeguards its faith in the fundamental reality of its whole creed: only one Lord exists and that Lord is 'ours' in the sense that he is bound to us by an indissoluble pact; he loved us, loves us, and will love us forever. It is from this source, this love of God, that the twofold commandment comes to us: you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength, and your neighbor as yourself.

Jesus taught once and for all that love for God and love for neighbor are inseparable; moreover, they sustain one another. To love God is to live of him and for him, for what he is and for what he does. So, to love God means to invest our energies each day to be his assistants in the service of our neighbor, in trying to, and in building relationships of communion and fraternity.

Mark the Evangelist does not bother to specify who the neighbor is, because a neighbor is a person whom I meet on my journey. Today's Gospel passage invites us all to be projected not only toward the needs of our poorest brothers and sisters, but above all to be attentive to their need for fraternal closeness, for a meaning to life, and for tenderness. This challenges our Christian communities: it means avoiding the risk of being communities that have many initiatives but few relationships; the risk of being community 'service stations' but with little company, in the full and Christian sense of this term.

God, who is love, created us to love and so that we can love others while remaining united with him. It would be misleading to claim to love our neighbor without loving God; and it would also be deceptive to claim to love God without loving our neighbor.
