THIRTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

The Saint of the Week

St. Martin of Tours *(November 11)*

Saint Martin of Tours was born in Pannonia, what is today the nation of Hungary in either the year 316 or 336 AD. His father was a tribune, which is a high-ranking officer in the Imperial Horse Guard. Martin's parents were pagans, but at the age of 10, Martin chose to respond to the call of the Gospel and become a Christian.

At the age of fifteen, Martin followed his father into the cavalry corps of the Roman military. As a young soldier, Martin encountered a beggar in Amiens. The beggar was unclothed and it was very cold. Martin removed his cloak and with his sword, he cut it in half. He gave this half to the beggar and dressed himself in the remnant. That night, Martin had a vision in which Christ appeared to him. The vision spoke to him, "Martin, a mere catechumen has clothed me."

About the age of 20, Martin refused to fight, following his formed Christian conscience, and was accused of cowardice and ordered that he be imprisoned. Martin offered to demonstrate his sincerity by going into battle unarmed, but before the battle could occur, the opposing army agreed to a truce and no conflict took place. Martin was subsequently released from military service.

Martin dedicated himself to service of Jesus Christ and the Church. He established a monastery which would be inhabited by the Benedictines. In 371, the city of Tours needed a new bishop and the people decided to call Martin to the office. Martin did not want the job so the people decided to trick him into the office. The people insisted he was needed to administer to someone sick, so he came out as quickly as he could. Even though he did not really want the office, he was ordained - and he became a holy and hardworking Bishop.

As a Bishop Martin established a system of parishes to manage his diocese. He made a point to visit each parish at least once per year. In addition to his appointed rounds, Martin combated paganism, particularly the Druid religion which was still prevalent at the time. He passionately and faithfully proclaimed the Gospel of Jesus Christ and won many to the Christian faith.

Martin died in Candes-Saint-Martin, Gaul in 397.

Polskie Duszpasterstwo w Parafii św. Bernarda i św. Stanisława Kostki



31 Niedziela Zwykła

Dzisiejsza Ewangelia rozgrywa się w ostatnich dniach życia Jezusa, w Jerozolimie. Są to dni pełne oczekiwań i napięć. Z jednej strony Jezus surowo krytykuje uczonych w Piśmie i faryzeuszy, z drugiej zaś pozostawia ważne nakazy chrześcijanom wszystkich czasów, a zatem także nam.

Mówi tłumom: „Na katedrze Mojżesza zasiedli uczeni w Piśmie i faryzeusze. Czyńcie więc i zachowujcie wszystko, co wam polecam”. Oznacza to, że mają władzę nauczania tego, co jest zgodne z Prawem Bożym. Jednakże zaraz potem Jezus dodaje: „Lecz uczynków ich nie naśladujcie. Mówią bowiem, ale sami nie czynią”. Bracia i siostry, częstą wadą tych, którzy mają władzę – czy to kościelną, czy świecką – jest żądanie od innych wypełniania rzeczy, nawet słusznych, których jednak sami nie czynią. Prowadzą podwójne życie. Jezus mówi: „Wiążą ciężary wielkie i nie do uniesienia i kładą je ludziom na ramiona, lecz sami palcem ruszyć ich nie chcą”. Taka postawa jest złym sprawowaniem władzy, której – przeciwnie – podstawową siłą winien stanowić dobry przykład, aby pomóc innym czynić to, co słuszne i właściwe, podtrzymując ich w próbach, napotykanym na drodze dobra. Władza jest pomocą, ale jeśli sprawowana jest źle, to staje się opresyjna, nie pozwala ludziom się rozwijać oraz tworzy atmosferę nieufności i wrogości. Prowadzi też do korupcji.

Jezus otwarcie potępia pewne negatywne zachowania uczonych w Piśmie i faryzeuszy: „Lubią zaszczytne miejsce na ucztach i pierwsze krzesła w synagogach. Chcą, by ich pozdrawiano na rynkach”. Jest to pokusa, która odpowiada ludzkiej pysze i którą nie zawsze łatwo pokonać. Jest to postawa życia wyłącznie pozorami.

Następnie Jezus daje swoim uczniom nakazy: „Nie pozwalajcie nazywać się Rabbi, albowiem jeden jest wasz Nauczyciel, a wy wszyscy braćmi jesteście [...] Nie chcecie również, żeby was nazywano mistrzami, bo jeden jest tylko wasz Mistrz, Chrystus. Największy z was niech będzie waszym sługą”.

My, uczniowie Jezusa, nie powinniśmy dążyć do godności zaszczytnych, władzy czy zwierzchnictwa. Wyznam wam, że mnie osobiście

martwi, gdy widzę ludzi, którzy psychologicznie żyją, goniąc za próżnością zaszczytów. My, uczniowie Jezusa, nie powinniśmy tego czynić, bo między nami powinna być postawa prostoty i braterstwa. Wszyscy jesteśmy braćmi i nie powinniśmy w żaden sposób przytłaczać innych. Wszyscy jesteśmy braćmi. Jeśli od Ojca Niebieskiego otrzymaliśmy pewne przymioty, to winniśmy je spożytkować w służbie braciom a nie wykorzystywać je dla naszej satysfakcji i interesu osobistego. Nie powinniśmy uważać się za lepszych od innych. Skromność ma istotne znaczenie w życiu kogoś, kto chce żyć zgodnie z nauczaniem Jezusa, łagodnego i pokornego sercem i który przyszedł nie po to, aby Mu służyło, lecz aby służyć.

Niech Maryja Panna, „Najpokorniejsza i najwyższa w niebie”, pomaga nam, przez swoje macierzyńskie wstawiennictwo wystrzegać się pychy i próżności oraz być posłusznymi miłości, która pochodzi od Boga, aby służyć naszym braciom i ich radości, która będzie również naszą radością.

From Fr. Marcin's Desk

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Today's readings present us with an image of the corrupted pastoral leadership. The prophet Malachi is attacking priests for not caring for their people, and through their attitude, creating a lot of confusion with their instructions.

In the Gospel, Christ is pointing out that the scribes and Pharisees sit on Moses' seat, meaning that they have the authority to teach what is in conformity with the Law of God. However, Christ says, "listen to them; do not follow their example, for they preach, but do not practice."

A frequent flaw of those in authority, whether civil or ecclesiastic authority, is that of demanding of others things — even righteous things — that they themselves do not put into practice. This attitude sets a bad example of authority, which should instead derive its primary strength precisely from setting a good example. Authority that arises from a good example is a help, but if it is wrongly exercised, it becomes oppressive; it does not allow people to grow, and creates a climate of distrust and hostility, and also leads to corruption.

We as disciples of Jesus must not seek titles of honor, of authority or supremacy. We are all brothers and sisters, and in no way must we abuse others or look down on them. If we have received talents from the heavenly Father, we must place them at the service of our brothers and sisters and not exploit them for our own satisfaction or personal interests. We must not consider ourselves superior to others; modesty is essential for an existence that seeks to conform to the teaching of Jesus, who is meek and humble of heart and came not to be served but to serve. Those who are in charge in a Christian community should be like a servant, like a slave - *all of us are brothers in Christ.*
